Helicopter Stories and writing development The Poetry Basket (3 per term)	Adults scribing and writing down word for word, child decides part he/she would like to play and then on a simple stage to act out the story. Writing using initial sounds and making initial links between children's phonetic knowledge and their writing skills.		Adults are dictated to by the child, the adult says each word as it is written, pointing out gaps and punctuation. Re-reading and scanning and checking writing. Child begins to write the initial sound of a word and the adult continues to write the other parts of the story. Children are now able to apply their 'Fred Talk' through RWInc sessions to writing and mark making. Writing moves away from simply being part of the phonics process.
